
This year we took great pride on hearing Queen's Park High School had qualified as a finalist in not just one but three award categories; 'Inspirational Teacher of the Year', 'School in the Community' and 'Team of the Year'.

All finalists including staff and students were invited to the ceremony where the winners of ten award categories were revealed. On announcing the winner of Class/Team of the Year Award, Year 10 students Beth Henderson-Palmer, Tyler Gordon and Kiara Parlevliet (on behalf of 'Team Dunkers') along with Miss Finola Sutton (Achievement Leader for Science) were called to the stage to accept the award.

This genius Stem Club team have had an astonishingly successful year. They have gone from strength to strength, winning the regional heats at The Big Bang and then representing the school at The Big Bang National Finals achieving the runner up prize for the prestigious Junior Science award. The team of seven which also included Rory Jones, James Fawcett, Adam Thomas and Maddy Lewis have worked tirelessly during after school STEM club to perfect their inspirational and unique invention the biscuit dunking machine! Their outstanding teamwork has now been recognised by the Cheshire Schools Awards - another incredible achievement!

This is the third year the school has been recognised for their outstanding achievement at this prestigious event. In 2017 Headteacher Miss Watterson was awarded the Secondary School Headteacher of the Year Award and last year the school were announced winners of the Communication award.

The budding coders were totally focussed and engaged throughout the morning. They got to grips with programming digital art and animations, learned how to translate colour values into code, and created their own reaction game on BBC Micro:bits! By completing sets of small challenges they were able to learn the basics of code structure and formatting in two different programming languages.

Due to its popularity, we hope to run a follow up coding session after the summer holidays – watch this space if you want to reserve your place!



During the coding club enrichment lesson back in December, Oliver Womack and Jayden Howard in Year 7 took part in Mission Zero, the European Astro Pi Challenge 2018-19 and designed a python programme which they 'beamed up' to the International Space Station (ISS). Astronauts aboard the space station would then run the code designed to take temperature readings inside the ISS and display messages from the students. We are delighted to report we have just had confirmation from the European Space Agency that the students' script successfully ran 500km East of New York over the Atlantic Ocean on 2nd May at 14:06 for 28 seconds! Congratulations to Oliver and Jayden – that's what we'd call 'mission accomplished'!









EXPLORING OUR WORLD

At the beginning of June, we were thrilled to welcome over 300 Year 5 children for our second Curriculum Challenge Day of this academic year. Based on the theme 'Exploring our World', children from ten primary schools across Chester were eager to experience a taste of high school life and rise to the challenging and exciting learning opportunities that our curriculum teams had planned for them. The children worked in mixed school groups to take part in workshops based in three faculty areas - science, social studies and Ebacc.

"It's not Rocket Science..." well in fact it is! In science, we looked at space travel and how rockets use energy to travel beyond our planet. We looked at two different types of rocket - the first a chemical rocket powered by Alka Seltzer tablets which, when they react with water, use the gas produced (that would usually make somebody burp!) to set off a small canister rocket. The children were amazed as almost all their tiny spaceships managed to hit the ceiling!

The second type was a physics propelled rocket. The children built a paper craft on the end of a hosepipe which connected to a plastic drinks bottle. They found great enjoyment in jumping on the bottle to release a large volume of air which forced the rocket upwards......'to infinity and beyond'!

It's not rocket science - Year 5 say it is!

When our young visitors ventured to the EBACC department they had great fun sailing the seas with Sir Francis Drake, debating how to avert disaster on the open seas, rescue treasure for the Queen and fend off some very angry Spanish pirates! This was all before they got very glittery and colourful whilst creating masks for one of the biggest carnivals in the world which takes place in Colombia. It's safe to say they had a great time and may still be washing glitter out of their hair!

During the day, the children learnt about making ethical financial decisions linked to the subject areas of citizenship, business and RE. Students found out about Nike as a company and judged whether or not Nike is acting in a socially responsible and ethical way towards their workforce in Indonesia. We considered fair trade, social justice and capitalism versus democracy as key themes. The children then developed their 'make a change' boards to enact change!



Brains, Wizards & Illusions

Manchester University's Psychology conference left Sixth Form students buzzing with experimental ideas and practical illusionary images. The conference enabled both Year 12 & 13 students to develop their skills in cognitive neuroscience, the scientific study of the influence of brain structures on mental processes. They also learned how the brain develops speech patterns and how these can be used to read the brain in 'brain fingerprinting' mind mapping techniques.

This cutting edge cognitive neuroscience is being developed for eye witness testimony and future lie detector tests.

The day ended with a visit to the Manchester University campus' Five Guy's burger restaurant, where burgers, fries and milkshakes were definitely no illusion to the students!



SNOWDONIA - HERE WE COME!

Score the quality of your environment

Our brilliant Year 10 geographers have recently undertaken some fieldwork around school in preparation for their physical field trip to Snowdonia National Park. This one hour session consisted of students completing environmental quality surveys of three locations around school, a land use map surrounding the sculpture garden and a field sketch from the back field.

All students have now accessed the skills they need to answer the question: has tourism had a positive or negative impact on two contrasting locations in Snowdonia National Park ready for their trip in July.



During July our Year 12 Geographers explored the Nant Ffrancon valley to collect field data in preparation for their coursework write-up commencing in September. Their key focus was on features of glacial erosion.

For their final A-level Geography trip, Year 13 students travelled to the Snowdonia Mountains to develop their knowledge of glacial systems and landscapes.

The students completed the Ogwen Trail around Cwm Idwal to recap and reflect on the knowledge and concepts they had learned in the classroom. Year 13 have since sat their A-level examinations and we wish them the very best of luck for their results in the summer.









Over the past five months, our Year 12 drama students have been preparing a piece of devised theatre as part of their A-Level drama course. On Friday 12th July the piece, based on the work of practitioner Antonin Artaud, was presented to a select group of parents and friends. The immersive piece of theatre took the audience on a journey through an NHS waiting room through to a subterranean operating theatre space, all cleverly designed by the students themselves. The experience of devising a piece of drama provided students with a great deal to think about along the way which has enabled them to become active practitioners in their own right. The piece served as a fantastic end to their studies in Year 12 and will act as a springboard for their performance and theory work in Year 13!



Much Ado About Nothing

On Tuesday 7th May, Year 13 Drama A Level students visited The Lowry to watch a performance of Much Ado About Nothing by the theatre company 'Northern Broadsides'. The performance was a contemporary adaptation of the popular Shakespearian comedy set in post WWII middle England. The performance was amazing and provided a platform for the students to use in preparation for the written exam paper which they sat in June. The performance was preceded by a final farewell group meal at a Chinese buffet restaurant.



'Flesh' Performance

On Friday 26th April, our cast involved in the production of 'Flesh' performed on the professional stage of the HOME Theatre in Manchester. The performance marked the end of a six month journey in which our students, along with students from CIS, explored a play text commissioned especially for the National Theatre Connections Festival. The students produced an exceptional performance with some truly brilliant moments of acting - students gained a wealth of experience from performing on a professional stage.









Maths students in top 6% of country

On Tuesday 30th April, 60 students in Year 7 and 8 joined over 300,000 other students nationwide for the UK Junior Maths Challenge, aimed at the most mathematically able students.

This was the final challenge this year, following on from our earlier successes in the Intermediate and Senior Challenges.

Students had one hour to work through 25 multiple-choice questions that tested student's ability to apply mathematics in a wide variety of contexts.

What made matters even more challenging was that for the later questions, a wrong answer resulted in the deduction of points!






ENRICHMENT WEEK

Ongratulations to all the fearless Duke of Edinburgh's (DofE) Bronze participants who braved the elements to successfully complete their expedition training this month.

At the beginning of June, 25, Year 10 DofE students battled against the adverse weather conditions to complete their first Training Hike/Camp. The training started with map reading and route planning before students set off on a hike across the picturesque local countryside. The expedition pushed students to their limits, both physically and mentally; testing their teamwork, navigation and interpersonal skills within their groups. They navigated through forestry, fields, footpaths and towns to show their understanding of map reading and their developing orienteering skills.

During the practice expedition students planned and walked a route from Delamere Visitor Centre to the camp site near Brassy Green where they set up camp overnight and cooked an evening meal on a camp stove. The next day despite a waterlogged field, soaked tents and wet clothes students navigated their way to Kelsall carrying all their weighty belongings in their gigantic rucksacks, a sure sign of their endurance!

In spite of the inclement weather, it didn't dampen the students' spirits and positive approach to the hike. They faced their challenges with grit and determination, demonstrating excellent team work, camp craft and navigation skills.

We are delighted to announce that all 25 students passed their assessed expedition and in July successfully completed their qualifying expedition, achieving the DofE Bronze award. Congratulations to all students, what a fantastic achievement!

This year there were two stand out nominations who received the award, Bethan Curtis and Reuben Wardle. Reuben has received the award for his achievements in Handball where he has captained Great Britain and represented the nation in international competitions. 
Racing in trying conditions at Northwich


