YEAR 7

Experiments & Discovery

STEM Club has been so popular this year we have run additional sessions to accommodate both Year 7 and Year 8 students.

During the Autumn Term, Year 7 students have taken part in an exciting seven week programme to carry out experiments into a range of STEM subjects.

The afterschool club provides students with the opportunity to get stuck in to a range of 'hands on' activities and experiments linked to science, technology, engineering and maths.

Students have worked in teams to design, build and test a self-supporting bridge using only newspaper. They've learned about force, friction and rocket propulsion by experimenting with balloon rockets; discovered how acids and bases react whilst making bath bombs using citric acid and sodium bicarbonate. They've also been making and learning about the properties of non-newtonian fluids or as it's more commonly known, 'slime' using cornflour and water.

To link science and technology, students learned about prosthetics and built a functioning bionic hand using only card, straws and string. During the final session of the term, students embraced the festive season and created their own snowflakes using crystallisation.

YEAR 8

Working with Chester Zoo

For Year 8 STEM Club this year, students have taken part in an exciting 10 week programme led by Chester Zoo Conservation Team. These workshops link to the work Chester Zoo do in the UK and around the world to prevent extinction. This was also an amazing opportunity for students to speak to a local employer and find out more about careers at the zoo and the work they do.

This has included a range of hands-on activities and creative opportunities including students designing their own animal species and creating a village from Lego to understand the domino effect of electricity usage and its effect on the climate. Students have also worked in groups to play a game of conservation consequences based on the game consequence, which involved writing a story as a group to demonstrate Chester Zoo's conservation project. Students have also produced their own stop motion films to narrate the tiger and human conflict problem in Nepal.

The programme has involved students developing their understanding of reasons for extinction, the illegal wildlife trade and deforestation. Students have also learnt how conservationists can estimate population sizes using microchips and cameras. This involved students building a mammal tunnel to detect footprints which were left on the school field – unfortunately all we caught was a slug! Delighted to be back at Queen's Park for our annual event. We are always welcomed and pleased to have such a strong positive relationship with this school which supports the next generation of teachers,

PGCE VISIT

In November we were pleased to under welcome 24 maths and science PGCE work students into Queen's Park as part of their enrichment activities at the and

University of Chester. The student teachers prepared some group tasks to deliver to our students.

During their visit, the maths PGCE students observed some Year 10 maths lessons and then taught small groups of Year 7, 8 and 9 students.

Year 8 lessons focused on ratio , while Year 9 worked on probability. In Science students explored variables using shapes and pipes to investigate what effects the sound of pitches.

The lessons gave our students an opportunity to gain deeper

understanding of the concepts while working in small groups. Our students were encouraged to discuss their ideas and use manipulatives to support their learning. The teaching sessions were followed by a Question and Answer session where the PGCE students quizzed Mr Mosses and Mrs Blears-Chalmers about teaching maths and giving them an insight into life as a teacher!

Students' feedback was positive and our visitors were very complimentary about our students' attitude and understanding.

We look forward to more collaborative work with Dr Bamber, Mrs Packer and the PGCE students in the coming months.

Sharing best practice with Cheshire teachers

Over the past two years Mrs Blears-Chalmers has been training to be a Secondary Maths Mastery Specialist, and successfully gained her accreditation in the summer.

Teaching for Mastery is the underpinning principle of how maths is taught at Queen's Park High School. We teach to deepen the students' understanding of concepts using a variety of strategies and ensure students have skills that are transferable to other settings.

We are fortunate enough to work closely with the West Cheshire and Wirral Maths Hub, and welcomed 13 maths teachers who are Mastery Advocates into school for a workshop.

Our visitors observed Mrs Blears-Chalmers teaching a Year 9 class (31 students and 14 adults in one room – thanks to Miss Oliver for lending her large classroom!).

Following the observation, the advocates took part in a workshop led by Jayne Watts and Mrs Blears-

Chalmers, where they were introduced to the five big ideas of teaching for mastery and asked to identify the strategies seen in the Year 9 lesson. Advocates were then given the opportunity to plan the next steps and consider how they might use the ideas seen in their own teaching.

Following this session, Mrs Blears-Chalmers will then be visiting two of the advocate teachers to support their journey of developing teaching for mastery.

The visitors also commented on the exceptional behaviour of our students and said they were amazing ambassadors for our school.

Well done Year 9!

Maths week adventure

Maths Week England was set up in 2019 with the goal of ensuring that no children miss out on the opportunities that being a confident competent mathematician can give them. In 2021 it became the largest national maths festival in the world, helping to build a nation of confident mathematicians, who both use and enjoy mathematics.

In conjunction with Maths Week 2022, Queen's Park High School maths department organised an exciting competition for all Year 7 and 8 students; their first maths treasure hunt!

Fifty staff from different departments around the school volunteered to wear a number badge. Students were given an entry form and then set to the challenge; to find a variety of numbers with different properties: even, odd, Factor of 48, square number etc... that answered each question correctly. In total there were 10 categories, and each number & member of staff could be used only once. Staff discovered whether they were a prime, square or triangle number!

During the week students searched the school to find staff with the numbers they needed and the entries box was emptied every day. When the number treasure hunt finished and all the answers had been checked, the correct entries were placed into a draw and the winners announced by the maths department's special guest - Buddy the Elf aka Mr Nixon!

CYBERFIRST Cyber security competition

This year two teams of Year 8 girls from Queen's Park High School competed in the qualifying round of the Cyberfirst Girls Competition.

This annual competition is organised by the National Cyber Security Centre which aims to engage girls in Cyber security and inspire them to think about future careers in this sector. 1

Each team was made up of four girls.

The qualifier consisted of a large number of challenges which fell into five categories: Logic and Coding, Networking, Cyber Security, Cryptography and Speciality (everything else). These could be completed in any order and each challenge ranged from 10 points upwards, depending on the difficulty.

Congratulations to our winning team: *Slay* (made up of Lydia S, Sasha M, Emma C and Sophie B), who scored a grand total of 2466 points! Well done to our runners up team: *You Go Girl!* (made up of Nainika B, Martha R, Maria S and Grace O) who scored a total of 626 points.

Both teams worked extremely hard on every challenge they took part in, both in-school and at home. Unfortunately, our teams didn't quite get enough points to go through to the regional finals, but they have all earned a certificate from the NCSC (part of GCHQ).

JINGLE BELLS Belgrave music masterclass

Mrs Tonon has been working with our feeder primary school Belgrave as part of her role as Strategic Lead for Secondary Music PGCE through the University of Chester.

In December, she organised a music workshop with Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 children with a focus on group singing.

They began with syllable games and matching body percussion with 1 and 2 syllable words, then transferred these skills to "Jingle Bells". Once all children mastered the lyrics and body percussion movement, they all went on to sing whilst Mrs Tonon played the chordal accompaniment.

The children learned about the musical terms tune, rhythm, and dynamics and used these to make their performance exciting.

After break, the group moved to the school's hall where they combined what they had learnt earlier in the morning to a 4 part Canon. The children sang in 4 parts and were able to hold their own tune throughout!

Well done to all the children, who managed to achieve this very challenging task in only 2 hours!





WHAT IS GEOGRAPHY?

Interacting with the environment

Fieldwork is an opportunity for geographers to get out from behind the desk, to go and study the local environment, and that is exactly what our Year 7s have done in their geography lessons this term.

Students created a question and hypothesis surrounding litter at Queen's Park High School and used quantitative data collection to find results.

Focusing on *What is Geography*? as their module, Year 7 have learned all about the different types of geography and how humans interact with the environment.

Litter makes a place look messy and can give it a bad impression. It can carry germs, attract flies and rodents, and can harm birds and other wildlife too. The aim of our Year 7 fieldwork was to find out whether litter is a problem here in Queen's Park High School.

Year 7 groups worked brilliantly in small teams to walk around school and surrounding outdoor spaces, to see what litter they could find in each area. This involved them checking the litter bins and recording how full they were in each area. Students then used their data collection to analyse and evaluate results to test their hypotheses.

All Year 7 students participated in this mini fieldwork excellently, and showed clear understanding on the importance of looking after our local environment.

COASTAL MANAGEMENT

Transferring knowledge to the real world

On what seemed to be one of the windiest days of the year, our Year 13 geographers braved a day of fieldwork on Prestatyn Sand Dunes for their NEA data collection.

Worth 20% of their overall grade, the NEA is an independent research project that allows our Sixth Form students to step out of the classroom and bring their taught knowledge to the real world.

Students arrived at Prestatyn Beach and used their drawing skills to sketch out the local environment, including coastal management strategies and in-depth annotations of the coastal landscape.

After a walk along the windy beach, students arrived at Prestatyn Sand Dunes where their main data collection took place. Students took data on beach profiles, dune succession, and vegetation types using a wide range of fieldwork equipment. 66 Our A Level students collected an amazing amount of quantitative data, which will allow for extensive analysis and evaluation in their NEA projects.

Enhancing Learning outside the classroom

We have had very busy term with our Geography students, with a variety of trips heading out to enhance students' understanding of environmental concerns and careers within Geography.

The first trip of the year saw Year 13 A Level geography students undertake some fieldwork in the local area starting with a brisk walk to Eccleston, assessing the infiltration rates along the River Dee as we move closer to Chester City Centre.

In conjunction with this, students also assessed the impact population has on the environment, where they completed air pollution recordings, environmental quality surveys and decibel readings.

Youth Climate Change Festival

In November, a group of Year 8 students were invited to take part in the Youth Climate Change Festival at Chester Cathedral organised by Chester Sustainability Forum.

Working alongside the University of Chester and Chester Zoo, students were able to assess the impacts of climate change and how we can make our towns, cities and our individual lifestyles more sustainable in order to reduce carbon emissions.

During the event our young global citizens were very lucky be given the opportunity to listen to a special speech given by the local Greenpeace candidate on COP27 and what Young People can do to help our local representatives best represent them in parliament and local government.

Students also had the opportunity to find out more about future pathways and careers in geography. This event was also a great experience to explore their ambitions.



MANCHESTER AIRPORT Talking careers & improving sustainability



On Monday 21st November, Year 9 students visited Manchester Airport Visitor Park to work with the Runway Education department. The team enlightened students on the wide range of careers available within Manchester Airport and spoke about the qualifications required for different careers and how to make the most of apprenticeship opportunities.

Students then learned about the airport itself and how improvements are being made to make it more sustainable overtime. They enjoyed an in-depth Q&A session following guest speakers talking about the environment around Manchester Airport and what they were doing to manage their environmental impact and protect it.

As well as having a tour of the facilities around one of the airport's three terminals, the highlight of their experience was seeing the famous Concorde! They learned about how technology can improve travel overtime and how Concorde developed travel into the 21st Century.

Working in partnership with the Northgate Development Team, a group of Year 7 students from Queen's Park High School had a fantastic opportunity to work with Chester based artist, Lucy Jones to create artwork that is now showcased in the new Chester Market Hall.

On Thursday 20th October Lucy came into school to work in the art department and lead a printmaking workshop as part of the school's Cultural Enrichment Day. Students worked together as a team to create colourful surface patterns and symbols using stencil printmaking techniques which were then transformed into a stunning series of large scale banners ready to decorate the new Chester Market Hall. Students also designed a range of screen printed t-shirts featuring images and symbols coordinating with the banners, to wear during the market's opening event.

Mr Parker commented,

"It was a wonderful experience for the students to work with an artist in school. They showed great teamwork and support towards each other for the duration of Lucy's workshop."

Ahead of the official opening, a select number of students were invited to represent Queen's Park High School at the private launch event on Friday 4th November, accompanied by Mr Parker, Curriculum Team Leader for Visual Art & Design. The colourful banners and props created by the students were used to decorate the square during the proceedings before taking up a more permanent place in the market hall.

To kick start the event, students took part in a short procession proudly carrying their banners into the market hall in front of a host of special guests, stall owners and lucky golden ticket holders. Music, entertainment and food featured largely during the celebrations and was enjoyed by all.

Mr Parker added,

"The students represented QPHS at the market opening with beaming smiles for what was a fun event of a wide range of activities."

This art workshop follows on from the 'History in the Making' project back in June, in which Queen's Park High School was one of only three schools selected to participate to bury their own time capsule in the new Northgate development to provide future generations with an insight into life in Chester in 2022.

The new Chester Market is part of the £72 million Northgate development which has transformed the city centre. It officially opened its doors to the public on Tuesday 8th November with over 30,000 visitors. The new complex replaces the old market,



which had been based in the Forum since 1967. Cheshire West and Chester Council said the driving force has been to create a 'modern traditional market' influenced by venues in London, Barcelona, Stockholm and Altrincham and to create a 'unique blend' of produce, goods, food and beverage traders in a welcoming and inclusive space for everyone to enjoy' and where people can 'shop local and eat global'.

Our students artwork can now be seen in situe on display in the produce area until next Spring 2023 when there will be a more encompassing community opening for the whole development.

Enrichment opportunities like these enable our students to learn from employers, to enhance their personal development skills and attributes essential for life in modern Britain. Thanks to members of the TALS team the area has been revitalised and repurposed to offer a great work space for Sixth Form students to undertake their Independent Study and for other students to use the library space.

A full audit of the library stock was undertaken as a result of the implementation of a new library system. In partnership with Cheshire Educational Library Services, our in house library is able to offer all students an ordering system for books whether it be to support their studies or to read for pleasure.

As part of the Enrichment programme on Tuesday afternoons, there is a Book Club more popularly known as Book Loving Tuesday, which is well attended by student in all year groups. The students are currently taking part in the Cheshire School Book Awards having completed the first round of the quiz. The quiz is run by Cheshire Educational Library Services across all secondary schools in the County – Queen's Park has entered two teams from Year 7 and 8. The students will read six books over the course of the academic year on which there will be a quiz and general book quiz.

In conjunction with the Library Services we have been asked to participate in the Cheshire School Book Awards 2023. This will involve our students reading a selection of the latest Young Adult books, then cast their votes and submit book reviews. In May the club will attend the final and the winners revealed. During lesson times the library space and team are available to support Sixth Form students with their studies which include recommending and sourcing books, podcasts and interesting news items pertinent to their studies. We offer support which will assist students in their next steps in education and the work place.

The library is available to all students at break, lunch and after school as a place to study, do homework and find a new book to read. We encourage all students to come and say hello, hopefully find a book and be part of the next chapter of the library's life here at Queen's Park High School.

Rose will also be available for drop in appointments at our forthcoming Parents' Evening for Year 11 students, where parents and students can ask for advice.

Metropolitan Police talk

In November, we were thrilled to welcome back into Queen's Park, former student Wida Moghadam, to deliver a workshop to our students about crime and punishment. Wida now works as a sergeant for the Metropolitan Police in London. In her talk she covered reasons for crime, forensics, crime scenarios and FGM. Her Q&A sessions were incredibly engaging.

Year 10 Religious Studies students were able to suggest a list of reasons why people commit crimes in association with their work on theme E Crime and Punishment. Year 12 and 13 criminology students were able to display a strong knowledge of forensics and ask intelligent questions.

Mrs Merryweather found out what a zombie knife was and how it can lead to an immediate arrest! Students also learned about malicious communications and the forms of punishment they can lead to. Wida was asked questions including: *what's the worst situation you've been in?* She answered honestly and told students about a knife attack by a female perpetrator.

Students also learned about the different types of offences like affray and possession of an offensive weapon. They discovered what it is like to be a female police officer in a male dominated career. In Wida's station only 3 out of the 30 officers there are female. Wida did say she was treated differently but that this has improved.

Zahara in Year 13 called Wida a "girl boss"

and said she had been given "a real insight into the career of a female police officer".

It was great to catch up with Wida and see her doing so well in her career. I am so very proud of her! **99**

Mental Health Matters

In November, 14 Year 12 and 13 students took part in Youth Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) training led by Claire McDonald - Chester/ Winsford MHST Clinical Co-Ordinator and Alfredo Galera MHST. The two-day course, teaches in depth skills for providing first aid to young people who may be experiencing mental health issues such as depression, anxiety and psychosis and leads to an internationally recognised MHFA accreditation.

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Learning beyond the Curriculum

At Queen's Park High School we understand that school and indeed education, isn't just about the academic achievement students acquire at the end of Year 11 and Year 13. Our school journey here is about developing the individual as a well-rounded, culturally enriched young person with a vested interest and appreciation in the differences in society and the wider world around them. Our Cultural Enrichment Days, of which we have two this year, are designed to provide opportunities which sit beyond the normal curriculum and provide students with access to a diverse and broad addition to their learning.

On 20th October, we entertained a whole host of activities in school for all of our students from Year 7 through to Year 13.

Year 7 worked with our Communications Faculty to explore storytelling around the world, focusing on key texts and languages to explore how ideas are communicated in different cultures. Alongside this, a group of students were selected as part of the Northgate Development Project to work with a professional artist in preparation for the opening of the new Chester Market in the city centre. This was a fantastic opportunity to work on a collaborative piece of artwork that will be showcased at a major event in Chester and students gained a lot from working with a professional artist in school.

As part of our commitment to celebrating diversity and championing the rights of everyone to be who they want to be, Year 8 students worked with our EBACC team to look at diversity and understand how identity is a personal choice. Through a series of workshops, including one led by the organisation, 'Diversity Role Models' students were supported to understand the experience of others with the aim for students to become accepting and tolerant of others around them. The workshops were all very well received and supported our aim to be an inclusive school.

In Geography, students focused on fighting climate change and created protest signs whilst in History, they studied British black history reading chapters of David Olusoga's book. They also tested their mathematical skills to solve the enigma code created by Alan Turing.

Year 9 students conducted many scientific experiments and analysis on the day as they tried to work out who the murderer was in the brilliantly staged play, *Who Murdered the Headmaster*?. With the support of the Science department, our Year 9 forensic teams conducted a range of tests to determine an evidence base before the Oscar worthy performance of the PPA faculty concluded the day with the solution!

Year 10 students engaged in a variety of Art, Design and Technology projects throughout their day looking at specific assignment briefs set by big companies for them to develop. They had to work collaboratively and creatively to fulfil the briefs and there were some brilliant examples of teamwork and products produced as a result of their efforts. Following on from this, the year group spent the latter part of the afternoon at Cheshire College South and West looking at the range of careers and post-16 options open to them as they considered their futures at the local careers fair.

Year 11 put their maths skills to the test to embed their understanding of maths even further with a series of mathematical challenges that included creating intricate geometric optical illusions and looking at the Fibonacci sequence, proportions and the golden ratio in nature and the human body. This was an extension to the maths curriculum but the day was used to support students' learning in this area and pushed some of our students to apply their knowledge of the subject into a vocational context.

Our Key Stage 5 students spent the day focusing on mental health and county lines along with looking at career and employment opportunities. This is part of the school's commitment to ensure that all students, whether they are interested in Higher Education or not, are prepared for the wider world and understand the myriad of opportunities open to them post-18.

WORLD GB SILVER MEDALIST

A Queen's Park High School Rowing Club competitor has won a world silver medal in a new format of the sport.

James Cox, 18, who is now at Manchester Metropolitan University, finished second in the coastal under 19s men's solos in the World Rowing Beach Sprint Finals staged in Saundersfoot harbour, South Wales in October.

He was just a second behind Mohamed Rayen Hafsa from Tunisia in the final and was more than satisfied with his performance in both the time trial and three spectacular races in the final eight.

Beach Sprint rowing is a progressive new format, aiming for inclusion at the LA 2028 Olympics and confirmed for the 2026 Commonwealth Games in Australia.

James was the fastest boat in his age category during the time trials, almost three seconds ahead of Spain in second place. After that first day in

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Saundersfoot James said, "I just stayed relaxed, which is the best thing you can do in beach sprints. I really wasn't expecting to come first, so that's a bit unbelievable."

James is in his first year studying sport coaching and development at university after leaving school in the summer.

He is on the Great Britain Start Rowing training programme at Agecroft Rowing Club in Manchester, which aims to develop future Olympic athletes and also coaches rowing part time for Manchester Youth Rowing to under privileged children.

James started out in the sport at Queen's Park firstly as a Cox in Year 6 and progressing on to rowing throughout his time at school.

James won all team trial days that were organised throughout the year to be selected for the World Rowing Beach Sprint Finals and is hoping to take part again next year.
