Students in top 20% of the country

This long-running, national competition is exceptionally challenging and the best performers are usually from independent or grammar schools.

This is the first time that Queen's Park High School have entered this competition, so we did not quite know what to expect!

When the results came through, we were absolutely thrilled at how well the students had performed, being amongst the highest achievers and placed in the top 20% of the country!

Congratulations to Liv Halewood for winning 'Best in School'. She did amazingly well and achieved a silver certificate with only two marks short of gold! Shukrie Kemal was also awarded a silver certificate. with bronze certificates awarded to Harvey Jones, Tom Francis, Dan Kefford and Filip Fidler.

Mr Johnson also sat the paper at the same time as the students and had tremendous difficulty completing the test! It was suggested that both Liv and Shukrie beat his score, but this report cannot be substantiated as we go to press!


The official opening gave

5..4..3..2..1...BLAST OFF! Coding is out of this world!




Last week QPHS students took part in a programming experiment 'out of this world', with the help of the European Space Agency (ESA) and

Astropi. Students worked hard during their coding club enrichment session to design a Python program which they 'beamed up' to the International Space Station (ISS). Astronauts aboard the space station then ran the code that is designed to take temperature readings from inside the station and display messages from students. We look forward to hearing back from the ESA in the new year-they will let us know exactly where the ISS was when the experiment ran.

YEAR 5 ACTIVITY DAY

Rising to the Challenge

QPHS was buzzing with a flurry of multi-coloured jumpers on Thursday 29th and Friday 30th November as we welcomed over 300 Year 5 children for the first of our Curriculum Challenge Days. The children, from ten primary schools across Chester, were eager to experience a taste of high school life and rise to challenge of the learning opportunities that lie ahead. Based on the theme 'The Digital Age', children worked in mixed school groups to take part in three curriculum based workshops. They were also joined by some familiar faces (our Year 7 and 8 students!), who were fantastic ambassadors throughout the days, helping to support and mentor their younger peers.

Within English, Year 5 investigated 'fake news'. They were challenged to identify fake news during a news quiz then become fake news detectives when analysing a fake news article. The children looked at spelling, punctuation and grammar and how these could be giveaways of 'fake' content. Finally, the children worked in pairs to create a script for a live news report, which they then presented to the class. In visual art, children looked at artist Damien Hirst's butterfly series and how the kaleidoscope creates a magical world of colours and patterns. During the workshop, children mastered the basic techniques - tools and processes in Adobe Photoshop - to create rhythmic patterns to produce some stunning digital kaleidoscope images.

6 All the children engaged with the different sessions and showed real commitment and enthusiasm throughout the day to achieve some fantastic outcomes. They were well supported by their peers from QPHS and of course staff from their own schools. A big thank you to the English, maths and art teams for their work in planning and delivering such exciting and engaging workshops. I look forward to welcoming the children and staff back to QPHS in the summer term for our second challenge day. 99

In maths, children were taken on a journey of discovery as they explored counting through the ages from 'abacus to Apple'. They were given the opportunity to build and use an abacus, read and write Egyptian hieroglyphics and understand the workings of binary code; the language of computers. They also had the chance to create some binary monsters of their own using a grid to create a pattern that could be converted into binary code. Some of the children presented their understanding of counting through the ages back to all 300 children in the hall at the end of the day - a very brave thing to do!

All new courses enjoy a 12 week 'taster' period, so students are only committed to 12 lessons to see how things go. After that time, a report on progress will be sent and students can then decide to continue with lessons, cancel further lessons or change their course.

It's not every day that our school is approached to see if we can provide young actors for a major, new BBC primetime drama. Working in partnership with the Christleton International Studio, a group of 30 talented male students from Years 7-10 were selected to feature in a new BBC drama entitled, 'World on Fire'.

The drama, made by Mammoth Productions, stars a plethora of major TV and Film stars including Lesley Manville (*Mum, Maleficent, Romeo and Juliet*) and Oscar winning actress Helen Hunt (*As Good As It Gets, Twister, Castaway*). The series is set in the first year of World War II and explores the experiences of ordinary people caught up in one of the greatest tragedies in human history. Our students feature in the episode which tells the plight of a Polish boy who is sent to live with his guardian (Lesley Manville) and attend a new school in England.

Students were selected based on a range of criteria and, the week before filming started, visited the *Space Studios* in Manchester for their costume fittings, rehearsal workshop and haircuts! The filming itself took place on Monday 26th November and two of our school classrooms were converted into costume, hair and make-up rooms for the cast. Students were then taken to set (the old Overleigh nursery) to film three scenes, which took all day to shoot!



It was amazing to see a large scale production in action with so many TV and film industry experts working on set to turn our local area back in time to 1939. The building itself was transformed internally to look like a classroom of the period, with lighting used to give the depiction of day

time, even when the sun had long set on Handbridge.

It was a fantastic, but exhausting (and cold!) day, however it was an incredible experience. The director of the episode will be coming to QPHS to Working with a production company was an amazing experience that I won't ever forget. It was amazing and I feel honoured to have been chosen to be a part of the cast. It was great to see how the cameras work and how much hard work goes into making a TV programme. As part of the schools commitment to CEIG (Careers Education, Information & Gudiance), Key Stage 3 students are given the opportunity to go on employer engagement trips. These trips are designed to inspire and motivate students as they learn about the workplace, the sector and employees roles. This enables them to apply their understanding of the 'essential skills' they have gained in lesson time projects and challenge days in a real life professional setting.
