HISTORY IN THE MAKING

Time capsules buried in new development



Students from Queen's Park High School, Chester Blue Coat CE Primary School and The Queen's School have each buried a time capsule in the new Exchange Square in the heart of the Northgate development.

The capsules contain a wide selection of artefacts that the students selected to provide future generations with an insight into life in Chester in 2022.

These include information on each school, timetables and school uniforms; students favourite things, such as hobbies, sweets, fashion, sports, music and TV; coins and Jubilee commemorative items; technology such as mobile phones and contact lenses; along with a Covid 19 facemask and information about the pandemic and how it has impacted their lives.



Students from each school visited the site, (some virtually), in 2021 and learnt about the scope and scale of the Northgate development, the Roman history of the site plus archaeology and construction techniques and careers. The project was designed to enable students to gain an understanding of local history, the construction industry, developments in their local area and careers; aligning what is learnt in the classroom with the world of work.

One year later, members of the Year 8 School Council including: Phoebe, Ana, Amy H, Henry H and Harry B accompanied by Mrs Watts were invited back to the site to represent Queen's Park High School and bury their time capsule.

The time capsules were sponsored by VINCI Building as part of their Northgate community engagement activities and the chamber will be marked with a commemorative stone plaque.

Councillor Richard Beacham, Cabinet Member for Inclusive Growth, Economy and Regeneration, said:

When the time comes to rebuild a future Northgate, I hope these time capsules will provide a wonderful snapshot of life in Chester for future archaeologists to discover and study, and be as fascinated as we have been by the archaeology we have found whilst constructing Northgate.

This programme for local young people is part of the Council's ongoing commitment to squeezing more value from the money we spend on projects like Northgate; over the duration of the build this has included creating new jobs, offering apprenticeships, and building partnerships with local education providers to inspire the next generation of construction workers, designers, architects, archaeologists and engineers.

A great deal of care and thought has gone into protecting the archaeology on the Northgate site, which was once one of the largest Roman fortresses in Britain.

Despite finding over 10,000 Roman artefacts, the works have disturbed less than three percent of the archaeology and the foundations have been carefully designed to let the building 'float' above the ground.

Once again, Queen's Park High School students have done themselves and us, as a community, proud. Despite the impact of Covid on their schooling over the course of the two years of GCSE study, students have shown endless determination and a

consistent positive attitude, all of which has culminated in some spectacular results, both at an individual student level and in terms of continuing the trend of improvement the school continues to show in terms of outcomes.

This year, we are particularly thrilled to see our higher ability students outperform all expectations with 29% of grades awarded being grades 9-7 (old A*/ A) including 7% of these at Grade 9, with 20% of all students achieving at least 1 grade 9. These figures show a 100% improvement compared with the last time formal examinations were sat in 2019 and maintaining the improved outcomes achieved in 2020 and 2021. As well as this excellent attainment, we must also pay tribute to the whole cohort of students who have outperformed targets across all measures, showing that they have made better than average progress overall as a year group.



During the summer holidays, Queen's Park High School staff provided a fantastic opportunity for all our newest recruits and led a special, three day free event for new Year 7 students joining us this September.

Queen's Park High Summer School has always been extremely popular with families as it supports students' transition to high school, helps to develop their confidence and prepare them for the next steps of their educational journey.

On Monday 22nd August, over 80 students gave up their holiday to get a taste of high school life and experience learning in a range of different curriculum areas whilst making new friends in the process. Over the course of the three days, students were able to participate in science, English, maths, Spanish, art, technology, drama and performing arts workshops. These included: designing, building and testing stomp rockets, creating Mexican Tecuán masks, problem solving with factors and multiples, making small textile plushies, describing a work of art in Spanish, performing a song, dance and script from Matilda, looking at freeze frames, composing their own witches spell based on Shakespeare's Macbeth and inventing imaginary creatures who live in the mythical 'Land of Neverbelieve' - such as the 'blellophant' to the man-eating mushroom! 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Morse code to ping pong launchers!

This term Year 7 have been busy completing a range of engaging STEM activities after school every Thursday. These have included presentations on their STEM heroes, debates on global warming and constructing steady hand games, to name but a few!

A popular activity involved students making a battery from coins, cardboard and tin foil that was then used to light an LED. This enabled students to develop their engineering and practical skills. They have also made their own LED torches and used these to learn Morse code. They were then able to send different coded messages to each other, which proved quite a novelty!

Students have also taken on the role of environmental engineers and set the challenge to develop a way to solve how to remove oil spills from the ocean. For this exercise they completed a range of science practicals and tested different materials to discover which could absorb oil from water. In STEM club we researched information about someone in a STEM career and designed a poster. We learnt new facts and developed our team work skills. I enjoyed doing this because we were able to work with our friends to create a poster. We then had to present our STEM heroes to everyone.

During STEM Club students have also been developing their team work and presenting skills. They have been writing debates to discuss if flying should be banned to help the fight against global warming and then presented these to the rest of the group.

Students have also given presentations on their STEM heroes. Their heroes have included a range of notable people in STEM including well known scientists such as Alexander Fleming who discovered penicillin, Professor Sarah Gilbert who developed a covid-19 vaccine and not forgetting our very own chemistry teacher, Mr Jones, who has inspired many a student to pursue a career in Science!

Year 7 have also been developing their technology skills this term. They have made a buzzer steady hand game using a range of materials and built and tested their own ping-pong ball launchers. This involved students taking on the role of electrical engineers. They wired a battery to a motor in order to spin a wheel which then launched the ball – this was a big hit with the students!



In STEM, we have done many things: posters, model making, ping-pong ball launchers and ehemical experiments. All of these activities have been fun. But throughout this term in STEM, I have learnt one thing in particular, to try again even after failure. That is how I have ended up succeeding in making a ping-pong ball auncher and a battery from coins.

ENRICHMENT WEEK

Space engineers, conservationists & zoologists!

Year 7 – Build a zoo

This year during enrichment week each year group was set a different STEM challenge.

Year 7 students took on the role of zoologists and conservationists and had the challenge of building a zoo. This involved students researching the important roles zoos play in the protection of animals. Students then worked in groups to design a zoo and calculate the cost for animals, food and ticket prices. This allowed students to develop their creativity skills and teamwork skills.

Year 8 students had an exciting day as space engineers. They were set two different tasks linked to the theme of space. Firstly, students designed and tested rockets made from paper and card.



The rockets were then launched using the air from empty drinks bottles. It was great to see some fantastic rockets but also see students develop their designs when they did not work out first time. The second task involved students working in groups to develop a parachute to allow their cargo (an egg) to land safely on a planet. Lots of different designs were built from a range of different materials to allow the eggs to land safely and intact!

Year 9 students spent their day designing and building a water filter. They used a variety of materials such as sand and gravel that would filter dirty water. The filters were then tested to see how effective they were at producing clean water by looking at the appearance of it.

During this challenge students developed their maths skills by calculating the cost for their water filters after they had purchased materials from the 'shop'. Finally, students presented their results and filters to the rest of their class.

Discovery CREST Awards

Last term Year 7 and Year 8 students took part in the 'Stop the Spread Challenge ' and designed a handwashing device that could capture rain water which could then be used to wash hands. Students' work was collected at the end of the project and submitted for a discovery CREST award.

CREST is a UK award scheme for 11-19 year olds recognising success, building skills and demonstrating personal achievement in science technology, engineering and maths project work. We are delighted to announce that 196 students were awarded the discovery CREST award for their hard work and the overall winning group from each year was selected for a special prize. To the delight of these students each also received a dynamic robotic spider!

We are thrilled for Keir in Year 10, who has been announced as one of the 'All About STEM' competition winners! Keir's innovative project proves how refuse in landfills can be put to use, in this case to make waterproof clothing!

MATHS HONOUR Michael Ord Award

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

LINKING MATHS & ART

The magic of Islamic geometric design

This collaborative cross curricular project united mathematics and art, to celebrate the common links found in both subjects.

For this year's curriculum enrichment day Year 7 discovered the magic of Islamic art and explored the wonderful array of geometric patterns that can be formulated and found in Islamic design.

Students took part in a carousel of exciting workshops throughout the day. Based on mathematical principles, they explored 4 different approaches in a variety of workshops which included: stained glass windows, digital imaging (using tessellations to develop their designs), Islamic calligraphy and 3D structures designed using geometrical shapes and forms.

At the end of a busy and creative day, students came together in the school's main hall to showcase their achievements. A number of students bravely volunteered to give a presentation to their year group and talk about the work they had made throughout the day.

A big thank you to the maths and visual arts and design departments for coming together to create a wonderful atmosphere that enabled the students to be challenged in their creative outcomes.







GEOGRAPHY FIELD TRIPS

Liverpool City Centre

During the summer term, Year 10 students have been enjoying the perks of studying geography and learning outside the classroom as they set off on their GCSE fieldwork trips.

They first began by evaluating the impact of the regeneration in Liverpool city centre. Students started their day at the sunny Albert Dock where they assessed how the area had changed from the 1980s to present day. Students identified changes to land use by doing a land-use survey of the area. They then completed field sketches of two locations at the docks which had undergone significant change. Students had to annotate the sketches with the key changes to the area.

After a walk around the docks students made their way to Liverpool One where they completed environmental quality surveys on all three floors and all of the entrances to the area. This would determine whether or not the regeneration has improved the surrounding area and environment within Liverpool One.

Year 10 are using this research to write up their investigation ready for their GCSE paper 3 exam in the summer 2023 examination series.

Formby Beach

Our second successful field trip of the year saw Year 10 visit Formby Beach to assess the importance of the sand dunes for coastal management as well as measuring the vegetation growth on sand dunes.

Students used clinometers and quadrants to measure the respective changes over distance.

On the hottest day of the year so far, we had plenty of fun in the sun, and were able to collect a vast amount of data that students will use as part of their fieldwork write up in their paper 3 examination in the summer of 2023.



GOING GREEN Year 8 & 9 Career Event

In June 35, Year 8 and Year 9 students took part in a series of workshops focusing on green skills and green careers within the UK.

The virtual event was lead by Ahead Partnership and included an introductory session where students were able to see what green careers looked like in the corporate world. This was followed by a two hour workshop led by volunteers from Pinsent Masons where students looked at developing their own responsible business idea, guided by the UN Sustainability Goals.

As well as flexing their business and enterprise skills, students were able to discover what it means for Pinsent Masons to be a responsible business themselves.

To finish off the event there was an interactive session featuring panellists from a range of employers within the green economy sector. This was a fantastic opportunity for students to learn more about various job roles within the sector, hear professionals speak about their experiences and career journeys, receive advice on routes into the sector and ask any questions they had.





SHOEBOX RAINFORESTS

Conservationists get creative!

Our Year 7 geographers were given an opportunity to create their own tropical rainforest as part of their Extended Learning Project (ELP). We were so impressed with the outstanding effort and creativity from all involved, and are very proud to show them off in geography classrooms!

Year 7 students have been studying Tropical Rainforests in their lessons this term, covering biodiversity, adaptations, tribal culture, and the importance of conservation. They were given an ELP project that used map skills, independent research, and data analysis to produce fact files, news reports and shoebox rainforests.

Sasha created an amazing mini rainforest using a wide range of materials, and carefully labelled significant plant species using key terminology and independent research. Hayden brought his rainforest to life using real-life materials such as grass, twigs and leaves, whilst Alisha created a 3-D waterfall running through the rainforest with fluffy clouds and textured rocks.

From rainforest waterfalls, to colourful (real life!) plants, to monkeys swinging from trees and jaguars skilfully crafted from pottery; these ELP's were created by incredibly talented geographers.

EXPLORING CHESTER'S HERITAGE

Uncovering the historical & religious secrets of our city

On Monday 4th July over 100 of our wonderful Year 7 students descended on Chester Cathedral as part of an RE and History trip.

On arriving students were split into four groups. Two groups were given a detailed and informative tour around the Cathedral with Barry and Sheila - volunteers who work at the cathedral with many years of experience.

The students were allowed to access parts of the building closed to the general public where they re -enacted a court case! The other two groups took part in a stained glass window workshop with Education Officer, Jen Stafford and produced the most beautiful and unique pieces of work. Students were allowed to keep their creations which will be showcased in the RE department back at school. After lunch in the grounds of the cathedral, Year 7 were treated to a historical tour of Chester by our very own, historical duo, Mr Howens and Miss Whitford-Stark. They thoroughly enjoyed sharing their local history expertise with the groups, showcasing the exciting sites right on our doorstep.

The tour included a walk along the famous city walls which have been built upon and developed for centuries. What was once a defensive barrier to outsiders is now a thriving tourist site welcoming all! The group learned about the 'kaleyards' or cabbage/ vegetable gardens serving the monks of the cathedral during the Middle Ages; the site is now a car park! Walking along the walls they saw King Charles' Tower, where Charles I would have watched his army defeated at Rowton Moor during the Civil War of 1645. The group were amazed to learn of the medieval plague pits close to the racecourse, and how the site of the racecourse would have been the bustling River Dee and port!

Not forgetting the Roman heritage of our city, we ended the tour with the Amphitheatre and Roman gardens. Students certainly racked up their step count for the day as they were taken through time around our vibrant historical city.

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














Acts of Spanish Kindness

When Jesy Nelson rose to fame with pop band Little Mix, she was abused online. In 2021 she opened up about the heartbreaking effects cyberbullies have had on her life through a BBC documentary 'Odd One Out."

In this intimate, personal documentary, Jesy exclusively revealed the impact online trolls had on her mental health as she goes on a journey of rehabilitation.

The Communications faculty chose this documentary to inspire a morning with Year 9, as we know that these students are reaching the age where they spend more of their time online.

Students watched the documentary and then chose from five media briefs to give them a taster of working in media. Students created a range of media products such as storyboards, blogs and print-based adverts to raise awareness of the issues raised in the documentaries. They had to consider how to have an impact using image, language and camera angles and had detailed discussions around the importance of the messages being shared.

RAISING AWARENESS

Talking Relationships

Queen's Park High School were selected to be part of a national pilot project called 'Talking Relationships' working in partnership with the NSPCC.

Students learned about the cost of living and explored ways to budget and manage their future earnings by looking at possible career options.




This activity enabled students to start understanding the skills necessary for success in life and future employment. Students also had the opportunity to think about the study options and pathways open to them and how these can be financed.

The award was presented to Adam by Mrs Prydden, Head of Sixth Form, during the Year 13 Leavers' Celebration on Monday 6th June.

After an introduction from college staff, the day was all about taster sessions - a 'hands on' approach to decipher possibilities of subjects for September 2023.


Courses were wide ranging from childcare to motor vehicle mechanics, catering to bricklaying and many more.

Whilst our school curriculum is designed to be engaging, diverse and deliver a broad knowledge base, it is always a pleasure to offer our Enrichment Week as an opportunity to experience learning beyond the curriculum. From Monday 4th to Friday 8th July, all our students enjoyed a fantastic range of educational experiences which took place both in and out of the classroom.

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Year 10 and 12 students encountered work experience for the first time (something we have not been able to offer over the course of the pandemic), whilst Year 7,8 and 9 students experienced a plethora of enriching opportunities and activities.

The science department once again produced a range of innovative STEM challenges including the design and logistical planning for a brand-new zoo!

The visual arts and design faculty combined forces with the maths department to look at patterns and shapes in Islamic art, they also organised an off-site photography trip to The Meadows and a belated jubilee themed technology and design day.

The maths department continued to broaden their offer with two trips to experience life at Chester University along with a morning supporting the Young Enterprise team and our Year 8 students with the development of their financial literacy skills for the future. English and Modern Foreign Languages had a busy week focusing on student wellbeing, Greek mythology and travel and tourism. Students learned about the Greek hero Odysseus, made masks from Greek theatre, and then performed a scene from Simon Armitage's play script of The Odyssey.

The Social Studies and EBacc faculties offered a broad range of opportunities including a trip into Chester to experience the culture, history and religion of the city and some deep spiritual thinking around the 'soul'.

Finally, the physical and performing arts faculty were engaged in delivering: emergency first aid training to Year 9, sports day for all KS3 and a week of intensive drama workshops. We were incredibly privileged for these workshops to be led by West End performer Michael Southern (Sammy in Blood Brothers) and choreographer Rhianne Stubbs who has worked on productions from all over the UK including 'Oliver!' TRAVEL SMART Students are pedal ready!



All students from Year 7 and 8 were given the opportunity to take part in the level 2 and 3 Bikeability programme. The Bikeability course is a practical road safety training which develops students' skills for cycling on complex, busy or fast roads and junctions. Students were taught how to identify important observations, choosing the most suitable riding position on the road, communicating intentions clearly to others and understanding priorities on the road.

During the session students navigated the roads in and around Handbridge, under the close supervision of three experts in cycle safety from Bike right UK, Joh Hughes, Oliver Briscoe and former QPHS student Jason Corbett (Class of 2004).

The importance of cycling safety has also been emphasised to students as part of the citizenship lessons. Mr Taylor, Curriculum Team Leader for the Physical & Performing Arts leads by example and has himself taken on a number of cycling challenges in the past, including the coast to coast as well as cycling the 1000miles across the length of France, so he is all too aware of the potential dangers posed by cycling.

We hope this course will not only inspire students to cycle into school, but give them the tools to cycle independently, confidently and safely. In total 52 student were successful in gaining their level 2 and 3 qualifications.

Well done to all those students who have now passed their level 2 and 3.

Year 8 rowers make their debut


Another weekend, another regatta. This was Queen's Park High School Rowing Club's first 2 two day competition in the calendar and with it came a buzz of activity!
