Works begin....

As I mentioned in the last newsletter, work begins this week on the permanent build for Christleton International Studio, which will be located within the framework of the existing canteen and linkway between our two main buildings (the ugly green building in the main). The works will hopefully be completed by Christmas but will obviously involve some disruption to our normal routines during that period.

The key implications for us are as follows:

- Kitchen to be temporarily located at the East End - all food will be served from this area and additional seating will be set up in the social area as well as the hall if needed.
- Sixth Form café 'The Beach' to be moved to the Theatre Bar.
- No through route from the main entrance to the main hall corridor – we will be routed via the Science corridor (circulation as normal upstairs though for students).
- The 'Gateway' area to be closed off and pastoral support services to be relocated.

We will look forward to January when we reap the benefits of the build as we can then move back into a brand new dining facility and also take back a number of areas of the school which will have benefitted from a refurbishment. These are exciting times, particularly with our new food technology room being about to re-open after half term, as well as the Trust successfully securing significant funding to replace the roof on the rear building with work on this hopefully starting over the summer. There's never a dull day!

Our numbers for Year 7 for September have almost doubled from last year and we are delighted to be welcoming our new recruits this week for their Induction Evening, as well as supporting them and their families to become part of the Queen's Park community.

I hope you all have a lovely half term.

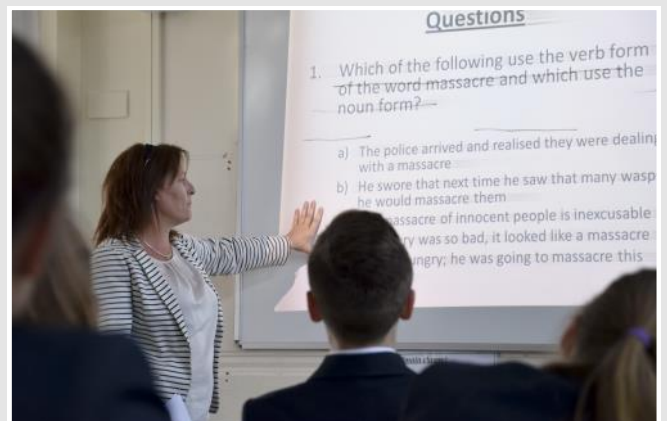

LITERACY LIVE

Vocabulary Stretch

Starting this summer term there will be a whole school focus on extending students' vocabulary. Research suggest that this is a key indicator for success. 'Vocabulary Stretch' is a programme of 'Words of the Week' where the focus is on motivating students to develop their word knowledge and to discover new words and their meaning for use in their writing.



This is a tutor time activity where all students in KS3 students learn new words and their definitions. To further embed students' knowledge, they are given examples of how the words could be used and then encouraged to use them in their own writing. 'Words of the Week' are displayed in all classrooms and their use is promoted by staff every lesson.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE PROGRAMME

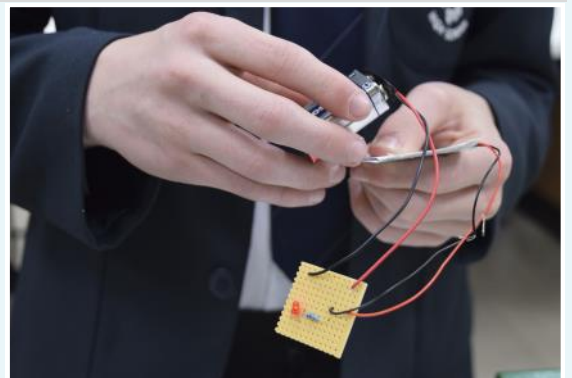


As part of the Academic Excellence Programme, this half term we have been learning about designing and creating robots. In after school sessions we learned about the four things that a robot needs. They are power (a lithium ion battery), movement (treadmills, legs, wheels etc.), sensors and intelligence. We also learnt about nanotechnology and its possibilities, which include use in healthcare to repair cells, fight infections and kill bacteria.

We were able to build a robotic hand using straw and strings and make our own censoring system with a circuit board and light.

We'd like to thank Mr Peter Thorn from Imaging Partnership for coming in and talking to us about robotics - it was a real eye opener! It really helped us get an idea of how technology will develop in the future.

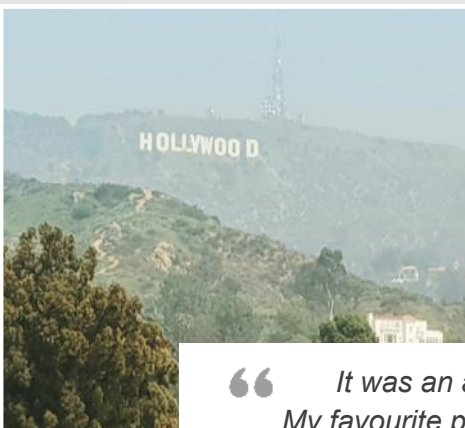
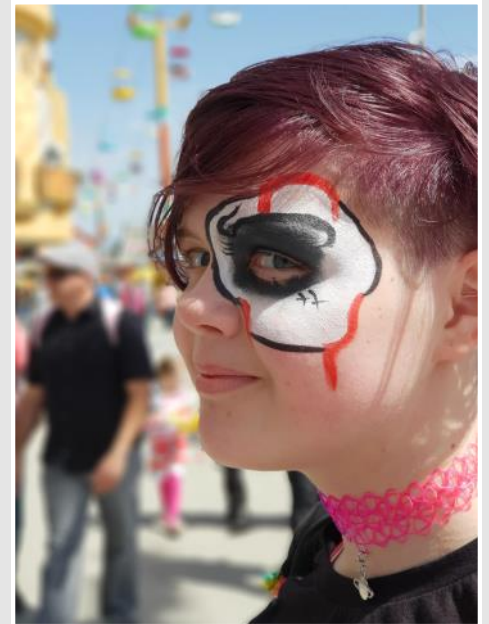
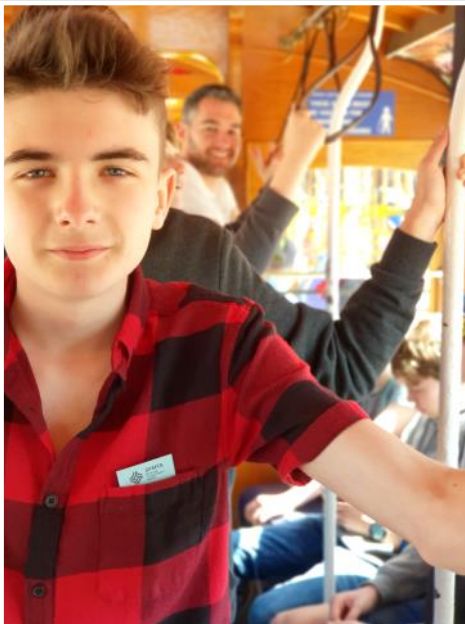
Students head to the West Coast of America



Part of our role as educators is to prepare our students for their futures, which includes giving them an appreciation of what it means to be a global citizen. As part of our commitment to developing our students in this way, members of staff from Queen's Park High School took 49 students across Year 7 to 13 to the other side of the world on a visit to Los Angeles and San Francisco, California.

After a gruelling 11 hour flight students spent the first few days visiting Hollywood, Santa Monica and Universal Studios before venturing up the coast through Malibu, up to Santa Cruz and finally to San Francisco. Seeing the Golden Gate Bridge for the first time was amazing and, juxtaposed against the island of Alcatraz, was an incredible sight.





As part of the trip, staff and students were fortunate to visit the islands and take a tour of the prison. They even met one of the reformed former prisoners and learned of his experience as an inmate while he signed books!



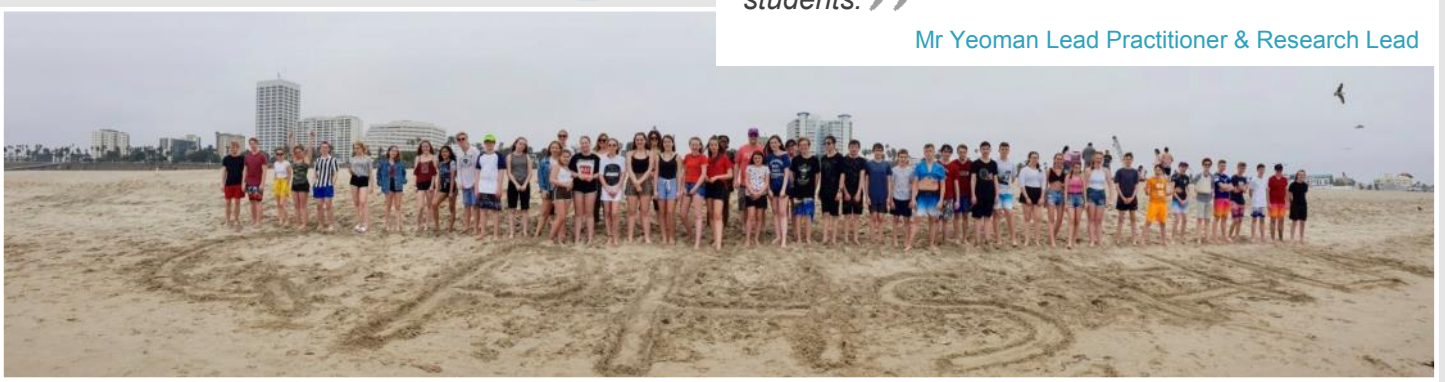

UK Junior Mathematics Challenge

At the end of April 2018, 60 students in Years 7 and 8 took part in the 'UK Junior Mathematical Challenge'.

The Junior Challenge is aimed at students in Year 7 and 8, and encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems.

Most of the questions are accessible, yet still challenge those with more experience. It comprises 15 multiple choice questions - students need to use numerical, geometric, algebraic skills and logical thinking to answer them. The Junior Challenge is the UK's most popular mathematics competition.

The students, along with 300,000 others across the country, worked exceptionally hard during the allocated time. Later in May 2018, we will present students with gold, silver or bronze certificates. 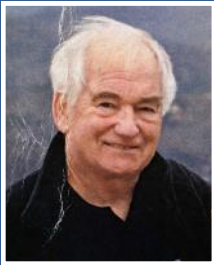

Sad News of Former Deputy Head

The school received the sad news last month that ex-Deputy Headteacher, Mr

Chris Middleditch died on 15 April 2018 at the age of 71 years. He was appointed to Queen's Park in 1972, just after it became a comprehensive school in the wake of the two former grammar schools on the site. He retired in 2005 after 33 years of service to the school.

“ I worked with Chris from my appointment as headteacher in 1989 until his retirement. Throughout those 16 years, I saw at first hand his commitment and dedication to the school. He was an educationalist with a strong belief in the value of co-educational comprehensive education. His students found his teaching interesting and inspiring and many chose to continue with the subject at university and into a career. Over the years he gained expertise across the whole range of the school's work, providing support and challenge to help colleagues develop their careers. His organisation was meticulous and his good judgment and steady hand contributed significantly to the work of the school's Leadership Team. He played a leading role in the school's successful bid to become a Specialist Visual Arts College in 2002.

Such achievement does not come without working long hours. Indeed I am told that his wife Polly, at times, felt like a single parent to their children Kathryn and Andrew! However, I know how much Chris appreciated the support he had at home and there is no doubt that he was totally committed to his family. His enjoyment of orienteering and playing on the staff cricket team provided further balance, but, I am told, also brought out his fiercely competitive spirit! As a season ticket holder at Manchester United, he demonstrated dedication of a different kind!

Chris' contribution to QPHS over the years is incalculable. He will be remembered with gratitude and affection by generations of young people and the many colleagues with whom he worked. ”

The boys ended the race in a dead heat for second place, and won coveted and acclaimed silver medals in the process.

Meanwhile, our own Year 9 boys, Dylan Howard and Iestyn Burke, battled well in their J14 double to
